The Airmen Certification Branch received information that you completed a BasicMed online medical education course. If you intend to exercise the privileges under Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations (14 CFR), § 61.113, to operate you must:

- Hold a valid pilot certificate that is not currently suspended or revoked;
- Hold a valid driver's license issued by a State, territory or possession of the US;
- Hold or have held a medical certificate that was valid at any time after July 14, 2006;
- Your most recent application for medical certificate must not have been completed and denied;
- Your most recent medical certificate must not have been revoked, suspended, or withdrawn;
- Hold a Comprehensive Medical Examination Checklist (CMEC) that was signed by a state-licensed physician after the form became available on April 24, 2017.

A review of your airman records indicates you do not meet one or more of the above requirements. If you do not meet these requirements, you may not operate under BasicMed. A valid medical certificate in accordance with 14 CFR § 61.23 would be required. Knowingly operating without a valid medical certificate can result in a suspension or revocation of your pilot certificate.

Please review the requirements for operating under BasicMed in 14 CFR parts 61 and 68. The FAA provides guidance and information to pilots about how they can operate safely under current regulations at <http://www.faa.gov/go/basicmed>.
